# **Leadership Development Workshops for Women in Industry Successfully Piloted**



On March 28 and 29, 2011, WWEST joined with the WinSETT Centre and two local companies to offer "Becoming Leaders: An Introduction to Leadership Skills and Strategies for Women Engineers and Technologists." Two slightly different approaches were taken: the first workshop was mainly participants from the host company, with a few participants from one

other company included. The second workshop saw about half of the spaces filled by the host company, with the other participants coming from a variety of companies.

The workshops were very successful - the host companies were happy with the outcomes, the participants gave positive reviews, and data from an occupational self-efficacy scale completed by participants indicated improvements in self-efficacy.

"Discussing these topics with other women increased my confidence and inspires me to continue developing leadership skills," one participant shared.

Following this successful pilot, WWEST is seeking new partner companies to bring more workshops to more women in engineering across BC and the Yukon.

# **Excerpt from Survey Results:**

# **WWEST** in Academe

During the first year of the Chair, WWEST has been focused on establishing relationships and building connections. Roundtable discussions have been held at UBC Vancouver for instructors and professors to meet, share their concerns, and network. # **WWEST** in the Classroom



A major initiative of the Chair was the piloting of Community Service Learning (CSL) activities in the engineering curriculum. The goal of CSL is to show students how they, as engineers, impact society and change the lives of the people around them.

In September, 128 second year mechanical engineering students participated in a one-day CSL activity at one of four partners: Richmond Nature Park, Terra Nova Sharing Farm, Free Geek, or Great Canadian Shoreline Cleanup. The CSL activities, and related reflection debriefing, helped students frame the upcoming year of classes with a social-responsibility perspective.

This summer, students completing their second and third years in engineering are being given the opportunity to take a unique technical elective — Mech 410E, Global Engineering Leadership. This technical elective has been designed to help students understand the role of engineering leadership through a socially responsible, global perspective, and utilizes a variety of guest speakers to bring multiple viewpoints to the classroom. Students also have the opportunity to continue the course into MECH 410P, a practicum course in international service learning at a partner community group in Mexico.

# **WWEST Partners**

The WWEST Partners program provides funding and training for community organizations that are undertaking activities to promote outreach, recruitment and retention for girls, young women and industry professionals. Grants are intended to provide seed or expansion funding, and Partners are encouraged to develop plans to transition to other sustaining funding sources. Grants are single- or multi-year, and may be for up to six thousand dollars.


- GEERing Up! UBC Engineering & Science for Kids: Workshops for Girl Guides units and Girls Only! Day camps

# **WWEST** in the Community

In October 2010, WWEST hosted a workshop within a Teacher's Conference hosted by the UBC Faculty of Applied Science. In the two-hour workshop, teachers were given the opportunity to try out four different activities they could use in or adapt for their classroom, all with ties to the provincial Prescribed Learning Outcomes for grades 8-10. They left the day with instructions for each activity and some of the materials required to execute them. The workshop was very well received, as the evaluation results show.

WWEST was also visible in the community at the UBC Engineering Open House, as well as at the APEGBC Vancouver Branch E-Fest, where we co-hosted a booth with DAWEG to increase awareness of women in engineering and challenged the public to answer trivia on how engineers help society.
